Conflicts of Interest Policy –

Abridged version

Compliance Luxembourg

December 2017

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Summary

RBC IS BANK S.A., including its branches and subsidiaries (“RBC IS BANK S.A.”) must identify, prevent and manage the conflicts of interest inherent in the business it conducts.

This policy outlines how RBC IS BANK S.A. to meet its obligations under the Luxembourg regulation and additional requirements for its branches and subsidiaries where applicable. These require a Bank to manage conflicts of interest fairly, both between itself and its clients and between clients.

1. Scope

The policy applies to all RBC IS BANK S.A. employees operating out of all of the regulated entities used by RBC IS BANK S.A.

RBC IS BANK S.A. employees are expected to be familiar with and follow the standards and requirements contained in this Policy.

2. Requirements

The responsibility for identifying potential (or perceived) conflicts of interest ultimately rests with the ‘first line of defence’ business unit heads (i.e. the heads of department involved in the day to day running of RBC IS BANK S.A.’ business e.g. Sales and Operations).

RBC IS BANK S.A. conducts business in varying capacities, and the Bank recognises that Conflicts of interest may arise as a result of this. RBC IS BANK S.A. is required to take “all appropriate” steps to identify and to prevent or manage Conflicts of interest between:

- the RBC IS BANK S.A. including its managers and employees or any person directly or indirectly linked to them by control, and a client of the RBC IS BANK S.A., or
- one client of the RBC IS BANK S.A. and another client.”

RBC IS BANK S.A. maintains and operates effective organizational and administrative arrangements designed to prevent conflicts of interest from adversely affecting the interests of its clients. Finally, where arrangements made by RBC IS BANK S.A. to manage Conflicts of interest are not sufficient to ensure, with reasonable confidence, that risks of damage to client interests will be prevented, then RBC IS BANK S.A. shall clearly disclose to the client(s) before undertaking business on their behalf the general nature or sources of conflicts of interest, or both, and the steps taken to mitigate those risks.

RBC defines a ‘Conflict’ or ‘Conflict of Interest’ is anything that impedes or might be perceived to impeded, an individual’s or bank’s ability to act impartially or in the best interests of a client.



2.1 Types of Conflicts

The main conflicts that Employees must be aware of relate to those that might arise between:

- RBC IS BANK S.A. and Client(s);
- Employee¹ and RBC IS BANK S.A.;
- Employee and Client; and
- Client and Client.

It is important to note that RBC IS BANK S.A. and the entities from which it operates is a member of the Royal Bank of Canada Financial Group and conflicts may arise from the Bank or its employees interactions with other group entities.

2.2 Regulatory Requirements

Banks are required to have appropriate controls in place to **identify**, and to **prevent** or **manage** conflicts of interest within the activities it conducts.

When considering conflicts of interest, the Bank will assess whether it or an employee:

- is likely to make a **financial gain (or avoid a loss)** at the expense of a client;
- has an **interest in the outcome** of a service provided to the client or a transaction carried out on their behalf, which is distinct from the client's interest;
- has a **financial (or non-financial) incentive** to favour the interest of another client or group of clients over the interests of the client in question;
- carries on the **same activity** or business as the client; or
- receives or is likely to **receive from a person other than the client an inducement** related to a service provided to the client, in the form of monies, goods or services, other than the standard commission or fee for this service.

2.3 Conflicts Management Framework

RBC IS BANK S.A. maintains a robust conflicts management framework comprised of complimentary policies (including global, regional and local policies such as Personal Account Trading and Gifts and Entertainment), supplemented by annual training and recorded in standardized logs and registers used by all RBC IS BANK S.A. business units.

RBC IS BANK S.A. business units are required to manage their conflicts on an ongoing basis however, consideration to conflicts of interest assessments, prevention and management will be reviewed more formally in the following scenarios (non-exhaustive list):

- changes to the strategy;
- changes to the business model/ distribution model/ operating model;
- organisational/structural changes;
- personnel changes;
- proposed new products;
- proposed new services; and
- proposed new client types.

¹ All employees of RBC, regardless of the number of hours worked and including executive officers.



Disclosure of Conflicts

RBC IS BANK S.A. will only seek to conduct business with a client when a conflict of interest can be appropriately prevented or managed. Where applicable, the exception to this is with respect to the Trustee & Depositary business unit which must disclose potential conflicts of interest to the client where the disclosure will be included in the fund (for which it is acting as Trustee & Depositary) prospectus..

RBC IS BANK S.A. will be deemed to have prevented or managed its potential conflicts of interest when it can demonstrate that it has taken all appropriate steps to prevent conflicts of interest from adversely affecting the interests of its clients

Where these steps do not ensure that risk of damage to the client's interest is prevented, RBC IS BANK S.A. will clearly disclose to the client, before undertaking business for the client, the general nature or sources of conflicts of interest, or both; and the steps taken to mitigate those risks.

In line with current regulatory requirements, the disclosure will:

- be made in a durable medium²;
- include a specific description of the Conflict that arises in the provision of investment and/or ancillary services taking into account the nature of the client to whom the disclosure is being made. The description shall:
 - explain the general nature and sources of the Conflict, as well as the risks to the client that arise as a result of the Conflict and the steps undertaken to mitigate these risks; and
 - be in sufficient detail to enable that client to take an informed decision with respect to the investment or ancillary service in the context of which the Conflict arises; and
- state that the organizational arrangements established by RBC IS BANK S.A. to prevent or manage that conflict (and where appropriate, RBC IS BANK S.A. are to clearly state that these arrangements are not sufficient to ensure, with reasonable confidence, that the risk of damage to the interest of the client will be prevented);

RBC IS BANK S.A. treat the disclosure of Conflicts as a measure of last resort to be used only where the internal organizational and administrative arrangements established by RBC IS BANK S.A. to deal with or manage its Conflicts are not sufficient to ensure, with reasonable confidence, that risks of damage to the interests of the client will be prevented.

2.4 Misuse of Client Information

In the course of their everyday work, officers, directors and employees may learn of confidential (including inside) or proprietary information pertaining to the business of RBC IS BANK S.A. or its clients.

Pursuant to RBC IS BANK S.A. policy and the applicable rules, no Officer, Director, or Employee may misuse such information. This policy reflects not only the Principles stated in the RBC Code of Conduct ("the Code of Conduct"), but other relevant rules and guidance.

As a condition of beginning and continuing employment, employees of RBC IS BANK S.A. are required to complete a declaration pursuant to their adherence of the RBC Code of Conduct and all other relevant policies and procedures.

² Defined as any instrument (e.g. paper or email) which enables the recipient to store information addressed personally to him in a way accessible for future reference for a period of time adequate for the purposes of the information and which allows the unchanged reproduction of the information stored.



3. Policy Review Schedule

The RBC IS BANK S.A. Conflicts of Interest Policy is reviewed every 2 years or more frequently as may be necessary depending on eventual legislative developments..

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
